Need for a global joint solution in Sri Lanka

President Mahinda Rajapaksa in his recent visit to the Vatican met the Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI and discussed issues relating to Sri Lanka and the need to promote reconciliation after the long civil war.

A brief Vatican statement released after the meeting said: "The hope was expressed that a global joint solution may soon be found corresponding to the legitimate expectations of all the parties involved."

The Holy Father and President Rajapaksa discussed the contributions made by the Catholic Church in the interest of the people of Sri Lanka, especially in the fields of health care, education, and social welfare.

"The Catholic Church, which makes an

"Let the infinite riches that God has bestowed on us, be shared by one another." So said His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith, presiding at the Sacred Heart feast, at the Archbishop's House Chapel, amidst a gathering of bishops,

priests, religious and members of the staff.

"Every one of us should discover and identify the riches laden upon us by God. It is God who initiated love on us. God so loved us, that He created us, takes care by providing for us, assumed humanity and died for our sake. More so God's

profound love is expressed by an intimate gesture in forgiving us and offering us the treasured reward of life eternal," the Archbishop in his homily observed.

"Human beings are materialistic, thus they tend to be avaricious of worldly gains, more than the Spiritual. The

inadequacy we possess in losing or gaining these material assets, make us sad and dejected. Many of us who assess God's love rated on tangible gains, in the absence of such achievements, tend to deny God's love. Let this attitude not overwhelm and defeat us," the Archbishop reiterated.

"The Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Fountain of Love, offers all who are open to His love, the glorious reward of salvation. Thus the Sacred Heart of Jesus, burning with love should motivate us to reciprocate God's love. Let us be a testimony of God's love and so be pleasing to Him and to one another," His Eminence stressed.

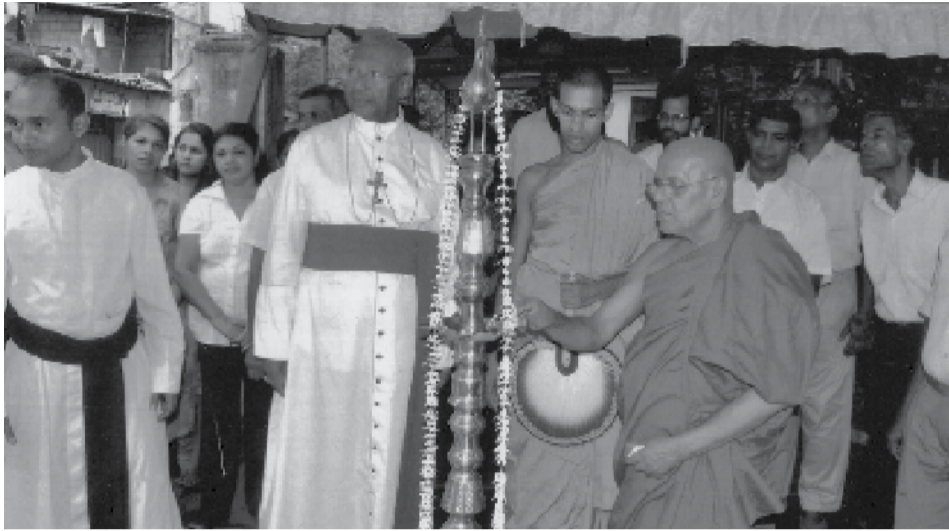

Pope calls for continued renewal amid liturgical abuses

(CNA/EWTN News).- At the conclusion of the 50th Eucharistic Congress in Ireland, Pope Benedict urged ongoing liturgical renewal – as outlined by the Second Vatican Council – amid current misunderstandings and abuses.

"At our distance today from the Council Fathers' expressed desires regarding liturgical renewal, and in the light of the universal Church's experience in the intervening period, it is clear that a great deal has been achieved; but it is equally clear that there have been many misunderstandings and irregularities," he said in a video message to over 75,000 pilgrims in Dublin's Croke Park Stadium on June 17.

"Not infrequently," he added, "the revision of liturgical forms has remained at an external level, and 'active participation' has been confused with external activity. Hence much still remains to be done on the path of real liturgical renewal."

Although the liturgy should be "celebrated with great joy and simplicity," it should also be conducted "as worthily and reverently as possible," he said.

In his eight and a half minute address, the Pope explained that the Council Fathers had wanted to renew the external forms of the Mass so as to "make it easier to enter into the inner depth of the mystery," and therefore "lead people to a personal encounter with the Lord, present in the Eucharist."

Croke Park is the home of Ireland's traditional Gaelic sports, and is also the largest stadium in the country. Gathered within it were the tens of thousands of pilgrims who had come from worldwide to pray and learn more about the Eucharist during the week-long event June 10-17.

"Ireland has been shaped by the Mass at the deepest level for centuries," said the Pope, "and by its power and grace generations of monks, martyrs and missionaries have heroically lived the faith at home and spread the Good News of God's love and forgiveness well beyond your shores."

Touching upon the troubled recent history of the Church in Ireland, the Pope said the "mystery" as to why some clerics would abuse those in their care can perhaps be explained by the fact that "their Christianity was no longer nourished by joyful encounter with Jesus Christ: it had become merely a matter of habit."

This was precisely the attitude, he said, that the Council had wanted to overcome so as to "rediscover the faith as a deep personal friendship with the goodness of Jesus Christ."

Pope Benedict concluded by announcing that the city of Cebu in the Philippines will host the next International Eucharistic Congress in 2016 before imparting his apostolic blessing and commending the Irish people "to the loving protection of Mary, Mother of God, and to Saint Patrick, the great patron of Ireland."

Faith is not belief without proof but trust without reservations

We Christians are called to be the followers of Our Lord Jesus Christ. We have faith only because the Holy Spirit has given it to us as a free gift for no one can believe unless the Holy Spirit has inspired him.

We believe in God but that is not sufficient for even the devil believes in God. Faith in God means more than belief. It means a total trust in Him and a constant fellowship with Him throughout the day and the night until we go to sleep. It also means constant vigilance to avoid sin and this can be achieved by prayer. Prayer is nothing but a conversation with God. He has told us to bring our burdens to Him and that he will grant us relief. Do we heed His call? Yes, we implore Him to grant our numerous requests requests for material rather than spiritual gifts. We ask for a good house, a good job, obedient children and so on. But God knows all our needs and He will provide for our needs though not for our greed or for our desire to emulate or outshine others which is itself a sin.

This attitude of mind towards God is best called mercenary since our faith is based on God granting us our wishes. But Jesus has said that we can enter the Kingdom of God only through the narrow gate. The rich will find it hard to enter the Kingdom since they are distracted by the riches and cares of this world like the man who wanted to follow Jesus but wanted first to go and provide for his family and return. But God assures us that He will look after those whom he cares for. We are required to first seek the Kingdom and then God assures that everything else will be added unto us what is required for us in this world as well as eternal life. But what about the misfortunes and problems in life we all face. Yes, despite them we should trust in Him even when the situation is hopeless and everything is black and looks impossible. Even if we have to die it is not a misfortune for He is the God who gives life and He can raise us to eternal life.

There is this inexplicable fact that God allows his loved ones to suffer. But suffering is no disaster. Suffering helps us to remain in the narrow path instead of straying to the broad path which is the road to perdition. Christianity is not a Gospel of prosperity. Nor is it a Gospel of despair. It is a Gospel of hope - hope of eternal life which can be given only to those who believe in Our Lord Jesus Christ - No one can come to the Father except through me.

Thomas Edison, the great inventor saw his laboratory and house go up in flames, destroying years of his experiments. But he didn't despair. Two weeks after the fire his electric bulb came to be accepted and a new age dawned - the age of electricity. Great people like him are just ordinary people with an extra-ordinary determination. Similarly our trust in God must not flag or weaken. We can do so only by living in complete fellowship with God. But such fellowship is disrupted by sin which is disobedience to God in any way. The first parents sinned by disobeying God and we do the same ever since. We want to do what is good but as St. Paul laments we end up doing what is wrong. But our God is a God of Compassion. He will not turn against us because we have sinned. He doesn't punish us or turn his face against us. But our sins remove us from fellowship with Him because we no longer feel inclined to trust him. We think He is angry with us. So when misfortune befalls us we think God is punishing us for our sins. But He assures that He is patient with us and will wait for the return of the sinner for whom he feels only pity not anger. But as sin disrupts our fellowship with God we lose faith in ourselves. But He is waiting patiently for us to return to him. We must confess our sins and He is ever-ready to forgive us.

As Jesus told the woman caught in sin - He will not condemn her but asks her to go and sin no more. It is the same thing He tells us. The moment our sins are confessed we can return to fellowship with God because our conscience will not keep blaming us and we won't believe that God has turned His face away from us.

A close look at the Priesthood and Celibacy

What does the Catholic Church teach about the priesthood?. The priests are ordained for ministry.

And 'ministry' means service, and ministers are servants, their lives are at the service of their congregation.

Priests work for God's kingdom on earth, and so they are called servants of God.

Jesus commanded his apostles (collectively) for specific works, these works are invariably sacramental and ritual. We see in every single one of the Gospels, Jesus commanded the apostles to baptise: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them." (Mt.28:19). He told them to say the Holy Mass: "He took bread and broke it....saying, this is my body...do this in memory of me." (Luke 22:19) He empowered them to hear, the sins of confessions and absolve sinners: "If you forgive sins of any, they are forgiven. If you retain the sins of any they are retained." (John 20:23). He sent them out to anoint the sick: (Mark 6: 7, 13). Thus, then and now, the primary work of the priest is liturgical and sacramental. This priestly ministry has been passed on to this day through a sacramental rite: The laying of hands. (Acts:6:6)

The Catholic tradition refers to the priest as - another Christ. By Holy Orders, a man becomes as Christ, to be the presence - the person and the face of Christ, the High Priest. And so we see by the sacrament of Holy Orders a man is changed for ever. The sacrament confers a permanent character, just as baptism does. Once you are baptised, you are changed forever - you are a Christian for ever. As the old saying goes, "once a Catholic, always a Catholic."

In the same way, once a man is ordained, he is a priest forever (Ps: 110: 4; Heb: 7:21). He may be an immoral priest and the Church has disciplined him - a defrocked priest, who may no longer celebrate the sacrament, he still remains a priest. Sacramental powers do not depend on worthiness. It is Christ himself who acts in the person of the priest - through his voice, and through his hands. St. Augustine puts it forcefully: "When Peter baptizes, it is Christ who baptizes, when Judas baptizes, it is Christ who baptizes."

Unlike the priesthood of the old covenant the priest-



hood of Christ did not fall to men by inheritance. It came by vocation.

Christ looked men in the eyes and called them out: "Follow Me" (Matt:9:9). From then on, they were set apart for service. They became a sign of the new world order. Just as men are identified by their trades, identified as who they are by what they do a priest identifies himself when he imitates Christ's life. Jesus promises that each of his chosen men would "do the works I do; and greater works than these will he do." (John 14: 12). The apostles had seen Jesus feed the multitude with just a few loaves. They had seen him raise the people from the dead. They had seen him heal the lepers and give sight. What greater works could they do, was the question on their minds. St. Augustine explains it all. "They will perform baptism, which is greater than creation itself. They would forgive sins, which is greater work than raising the dead. They will celebrate the Holy Mass which brings heaven into the midst of the world. It is for these sacraments that Jesus ordains his priests.

In the Old Testament the prophets speak of God as the bridegroom of his chosen people - Israel. "For your maker is your husband, the Lord of Hosts is his name." (Is: 54:5). Christ came as the bridegroom (Matt:9:15) to establish a communion that is lasting and intimate. With this wedding, he began a new life, a new creation. The Book of Revelation depicts it in visionary terms of the marriage Supper of the Lamb (21;2). In the Mass, the Supper of the Lamb, the marriage is consummated and become one flesh in union. We receive Our Blessed Lord: He lives in us, and we live in him. We have heaven already, though we can not enjoy it with our physical senses, we hope to enjoy it in

heaven for ever.

The Priestly Celibacy:

Let us get ourselves once more, back to the Garden. God created Adam and called him to give his whole life as a loving service. When tested, he failed. Christ, the New Adam fulfilled the role that the old Adam failed to fulfill. In Christ, God brought victory. He invites the priests of the New Covenant to share in that victory - to share in the singularly powerful mediation. There is one God, and there is one mediator between God and man - the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as ransom for all. (1 Tim: 2: 5-6).

Imitating Christ, the priest's celibacy is an outward sign of Christ's total commitment to the Church. As Jesus's self gift was total, undivided and undisturbed, so is the celibate priest.

This state of life, chosen voluntarily, leaves the priest totally free for ministry. He can give himself entirely - holding nothing back. This is the reason for celibacy of the priest. In looking back to what all I have written, we can summarise his role thus: He gives new life - divine life through baptism; nourish that spiritual offspring through the Eucharist. He disciplines the children through penance in the confessional. He instructs through his teaching and preaching. He raises his congregation to full Christian maturity. It is for this reason that we call our priest "Father." And fathers teach their children with authority. Henry Adams said of his teachers: "A teacher affects eternity, he can never tell where his influence stops."

"What the priest says from the pulpit, his congregation speaks to the world."

Let us pray for our priests, and pray for more good priests.

Peter the fisherman

Peter was a humble but a somewhat impetuous fisherman whose only ambition in life was to improve his fishing business. His given name was Simon, the son of Jonah. According to the Gospels of Matthew and Mark, one day when Jesus was walking on the shore of the Sea of Gaililee he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting their nets. Jesus had told them "Come follow me and I will make you fishers of men." At once they had left their nets and followed Jesus. Luke's narrative of this historic encounter is somewhat different. He states that one day Jesus was standing on the shores of the Sea of Gallilee and a large crowd had gathered to listen to Him. He got into a boat belonging to Simon and asked him to pull away from the shore.

Then Jesus had sat in the boat and addressed the people. After He had finished He had asked Simon to take the boat into deep water and let down his net for a catch. Simon had told Jesus that they had laboured all night and caught nothing but at the Master's command he would do as instructed. The catch was so great that the net began to break and the boat was close to sinking. Outside help was sought and a disaster prevented. Then Simon fell at the feet of Jesus and said, "Depart from me O Lord for I am a sinful man." Jesus had told him. "Don't be afraid from now on you will be a fisher of men." When the boat was brought to the shore Simon had left everything behind and followed Jesus (Luke 5: 1-11).

John's version of the encounter was different. It was Andrew the brother of Simon who had first met Jesus. He had rushed to Simon saying that he had found the Messiah and brought him to Jesus. Looking at Simon, Jesus had said, "You are Simon, son of John. You will now be called Cephas which when translated is PETER (John 1: 40-32).

Be that as it may from the time the two of them met an unbreakable bond of love and devotion that was established between Peter and his Master. As they went about together Jesus had the opportunity of observing Peter at close quarters.

Jesus would have been impressed by Peter's sincere love and loyalty and also that Peter was endowed with innate qualities of leadership.

Peter was with Jesus at all the important events recorded in the Gospels including the Transfiguration and was convinced beyond the shadow of a doubt that Jesus was the Messiah, the Son of God. It was in the northern city of Caesarea Philippi after Peter had proclaimed that Jesus was Christ the

son of the living God that Jesus had told Peter. "Peter, you are a rock and upon this rock I will build my church and to thee I will give the keys of the kingdom of Heaven (Matthew 16: 13-20).

Although Peter was very close to Jesus he tripped very badly when despite prior warning he thrice denied that he knew Jesus in the courtyard of the Chief Priest on Good Friday morning. Immediately afterward he was filled with remorse and went out and wept bitterly.

At the post resurrection breakfast meeting on the shores of the Sea of Galilee Peter had to affirm to Jesus three times that he loved Him more than the others before his supremacy, which had been sullied by his denials, was restored and Jesus asked Him to feed His lambs and His sheep.

On the day of Pentecost Peter took the leadership in preaching to the large crowd that was present from many nations a sermon on Jesus of Nazareth the Messiah and the Son of God. The crowd listened in wrapt attention and 3000 were baptised and received the Holy Spirit on that day itself. As the days passed the number of believers increased very rapidly despite the persecutions that had begun. The divine message was taken to the neighbouring areas including Corinth, the third biggest city in the Roman empire and the response was phenomenal. That infant church was very much on the move. With the arrival of Paul on the scene after his dramatic conversion the Gentiles were converted in large numbers.

The year Peter went to Rome is not recorded in the Bible. When he got there he found a thriving community of believers. Together and most probably with the assistance of Paul who was in Italy at that time they established the Church of Rome which became the headquarters of the Catholic Church with superintendence over all the Catholic Churches in the world. Peter

was the Bishop of Rome and the first Pope until AD 67 when he was put to death on the orders of Nero the deraanged Roman emperor. Peter lived up to the expectations of Jesus and founded a church against which the gates of hell will never prevail.

Paul alias Saul of Tarsus

This is quite a different story. Saul was born in Tarsus in the province of Cilicia in south central Turkey. He was a Pharisee and an ardent supporter of Judaism. As he grew older he moved into Israel and lived in the vicinity of Jerusalem. He was the most feared man by the growing community of believers in the Way because he believed that the followers of Jesus would be a serious threat to Judaism. He therefore

launched a systematic campaign to persecute the followers of Jesus Christ.

After his dramatic conversion by Jesus when he was on the way to Damascus to persecute the Christians in that city there was an incredible turn in his life as he became one of the strongest advocates of the Christian message. He preached to the Gentiles who rallied round him in large numbers and were eventually baptised. He was called the apostle of the Gentiles.

The events leading to his almost incredible conversion bear repetition. Armed with letters from the Chief Priests in Jerusalem he was on the way to Damascus in Syria to persecute the Christians when he was struck down and blinded. Then Jesus of Nazareth spoke

to him and asked him, "Why do you persecute me: Paul gave no answer. His escorts took him to a house on Straight Street in Damascus.

While he was there Jesus had instructed Ananias, one of His disciples in Damascus to visit Saul saying: "This man is my chosen instrument to carry my name before the Gentiles and their kings and before the people of Israel. I will show him how much he must suffer for my name (Acts 9: 15-16).

Ananias did as he was told and visited Saul restored his sight and baptised Him. Paul received the Holy Spirit. After days of prayer and meditation and study of the Old Testament prophecies he began to preach in the synagogues and elsewhere that Jesus Christ was the Messiah, Son of God. The people were amazed at the almost unbelievable transformation that had taken place but when Paul (no longer Saul) explained how it all happened they believed him. Encouraged by their response he took the Christian message to all parts of Central Asia.

Gentiles flocked to him in very large numbers and received Baptism. So committed was he to his new missionary role that he undertook three overseas trips with wonderful results. He was



taken as a prisoner for trial in Rome. While he was there he preach the message of Jesus and many were converted.

All this did not come to Him easily. In his second letter to the Corinthian (Chap. 11: 22-33) he explained how he was flogged, imprisoned, had to face trial and even shipwrecked. But he carried on regardless.

He wrote 14 Epistles or Letters to the various churches he founded and he monitored their progress exhorting them to lead truly Christian lives.

It is believed that Paul helped Peter in whatever way he could in the founding of the Church of Rome and in spreading the Christian message all over Italy.

Although the Bible does not record Paul's death tradition has it that he was beheaded outside the city wall of Rome. After his stunning conversion in Damascus Paul's philosophy of life was summed up in his words:

"I live not 'tis not I that live God gives me life, God lives in me."

As we celebrate the feasts of Saints Peter and Paul who have been designated as the most outstanding heroes of the Faith, let us thank the Lord for their remarkable lives and pray to them to ensure that the Catholic Church will continue to be a beacon of hope for a troubled world.

She heard the horn of the cab she had called for and took a last look at herself in the mirror, adjusting her saree. "Let me say a Prayer for Ajit and Lali and may God bless all the couples who marry today," she told herself.

Hospital Hazards

Did you hear about the person who got admitted to the hospital to have his right leg amputated and came back home with his left leg removed? Ultimately he lost both his legs because the diseased leg was the right limb. Media published stories about an Indian youth who entered a hospital for pneumonia and ended up losing his left kidney. The doctors taking care of him were involved in a corrupt racket of selling organs to rich patients who needed human body parts.

When you enter a hospital even for a few days you should be on your guard about the caregivers making mistakes. Nurses who are dispensing medications can mistakenly give you the wrong medication or the wrong dosage at the wrong time. Make sure that you get the correct medication at the correct time. Busy nurses can give you medications prescribed for the patient who is just next to your bed.

We get admitted to the hospitals to get our diseases healed. But do you know the hospitals have the worst germs or micro-organisms which are resistant to normal antibiotics.

You can easily catch any of these infections from the hospital. This is especially true of airborne infections such as influenza, pneumonia and other respiratory tract infections such as tuberculosis. You can easily become a victim to these airborne infections because there are many persons with respiratory diseases in the hospitals. The patient in the next bed may be suffering with tuberculosis or pneumonia.

Another unfortunate incident that can happen is transmission of infections from the health



care workers. In a premature infants unit few babies died of the same bacterial infection within a few days. On investigating they found out that the deadly micro-organism was transmitted through the finger nails of a health care worker who was looking after these premature babies. Trimming her finger nails and good hand washing would have prevented these unfortunate deaths.

General hygiene such as constant hand washing is essential for the prevention of such transmissions. Observe whether the doctors and nurses who are looking after your care are washing their hands thoroughly

before they touch you. Constant hand washing is extremely important to prevent transmission of infections from patient to patient. You have a right to check whether care givers are washing their hands before they touch you and when they are looking after you.

Medical instruments such as thermometers, stethoscopes and sphygmomanometers (blood pressure machines) that are used commonly between patients have to be sterilized before they are used on a new patient. If not these common instruments can become a source of transmission of infections between patients.

As happens in our private hospitals it is a good thing to have a next of kin, relative or a friend with you when you are under hospital care. He or she can be your advocate and check whether the care that you are getting in the hospital is not hazardous to your health. This is important especially if you are unconscious when you are admitted to the hospital. In some pri-

ivate hospitals you could be inadvertently billed for treatments and consultations that you never had; and expensive medications that you never got.

As a health care worker and patient in hospitals in Colombo, London and New York, I was extremely alert when I was admitted and treated. Once I was charged thrice for the same procedure, which was done only once. My wife was about to be given an invasive procedure that was ordered for some other patient. Fortunately I was never taken to a hospital in an emergency situation and I

was conscious to monitor the care.

We get admitted to a hospital because we need intensive health care. Generally the health care workers are extremely conscientious about the welfare of the patients in their care. Doctors and nurses are human and mistakes could be made. The patient, a family member or a friend, has to be an "advocate" who will monitor the care given by the health care workers. The patient has a right to know the care that she/he is given and the health care workers has a duty to inform.

A.C. Anandappa and is one of the original paintings which decorated the Nazareth Retreat Chapel, Nuwara Eliya.

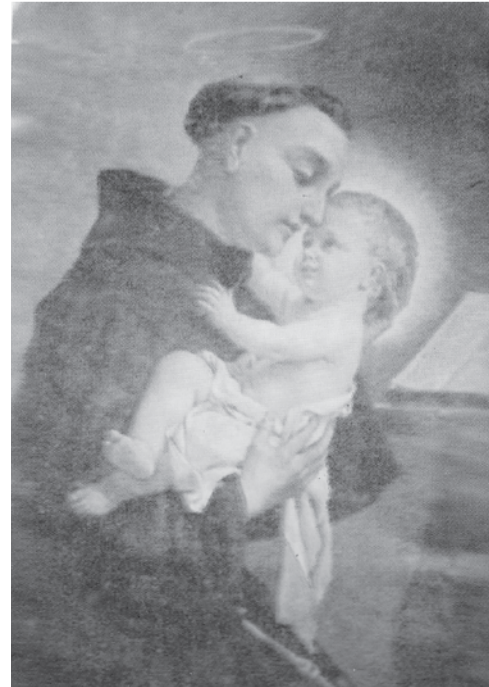
Ordinarily the Church observes the day of a saint's death as his feast, because that day marks his entrance into heaven. To this rule there are two notable exceptions, the birthdays of Blessed Mary and of St. John the Baptist. All persons are born with original sin. But Mary, already in the first moment of her existence, was free from original sin (for which reason even her very conception is commemorated by a special feast), and John was cleansed of original sin in the womb of his mother. This is the dogmatic justification for today's feast. This Sunday the Church celebrates the feast of John the Baptist. This feast anticipates the feast of Christmas.

Paintings of Lanka's favourite

The collection of paintings of St. Anthony is from the Nazareth Retreat Chapel, Nuwara Eliya.

When the Portuguese came to Sri Lanka in 1505, they brought with them their fervent devotion to their favourite saint. A saint born and bred in their own mother land Lisbon, Portugal in 1195 and baptized with one of their very own names Ferdinand. It was later that He changed his name to Anthony, after the patron saint of the chapel, St. Anthony of Egypt, where he received the Franciscan habit. Much later during his mature years, when St. Anthony went to preach in the Italian city of Padua, the saint's name became associated more with the Italian city of Padua, than his birth land. Today St. Anthony is venerated by both Catholics and non-Catholics in Sri Lanka, where ancient and new shrines, cathedrals, churches, schools, colleges, roads and villages

are dedicated to the Saint. It has also become the habit of many families to name a boy child of the family after the Saint. The feast of Saint Anthony was celebrated on June 14.

93-Member Sri Lankan Mass Choir on World Stage

The 93-member Sri Lankan combined schools singers led by St. Cecelia's Choir of St. Joseph's College, Colombo together with choristers from Good Shepherd Convent, Kotahena, Maris Stella College and Ave Maria Convent - both from Negombo, put themselves on world stage in the first week of June 2012, winning the hearts of thousands of international audience in the Vatican City.

This was on Wednesday 6th June, in the General Audience of Pope Benedict XVI which drew over 10,000 people from diverse nations. Their performance was captured live by Reuters, EWTN and Catholic TV and in audio visual clips in several transnational websites even though the recordings were not able to achieve the required standards. The contingent was led by Rev. Fr. Sylvester Ranasinghe, Rector of St. Joseph's College, well assisted by Rev. Sr. Renuka Silva, Principal of Good Shepherd Convent, Kotahena.

"Beautiful Singing" - Pope Benedict

Pope Benedict XVI, who witnessed the performance of the Sri Lankan Choir, remarked to the Archbishop, Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith, that the Millennium Anthem - *Gloria A Te* with its majestic trumpet call, was "beautiful."

The Sri Lankans stole the show, drawing applause as they entertained the vast audience with choicest songs in Italian, English, Tamil and Sinhala. These included Handel's "*Hallelujah Chorus*," Verdi's "*Va Pensiero*" and Mozart's "*Kyrie*," among others.

Historic Mass at St. Peter's Basilica

The Choir opened their programme with a solemn High Mass at St. Peter's Basilica on Saturday 2nd June at 10.30 am before a large crowd of Sri Lankans domiciled in the Rome area. Historically, it is the first time a choir from Sri Lanka was blessed with this rare opportunity.

Next came the Classical section with "*Miserere*" by the 17th century composer Allegri of the Baroque era and Mozart's "*Laudate Omnes Gentes*" with a boy soprano soloist blending exquisitely with the elegant violin accompaniment and fine keyboard orchestration. Thereafter it was the solemn "*Requiem Aeternam*" followed by the energetic "*Kyrie*" Eleison and the fiery "*Dies Ire*" all from Mozart's memorable Requiem.

Handel's segment next featured the glorious "*Worthy is the lamb*" and "*The Hallelujah Chorus*," followed by songs in English "*The King is Coming*" with a Tenor/ Bass duet backed by the choir and human solidarity songs including "*World in Union*" and a Gospel version of "*Lean on Me*."

The final section of Italian songs featured the popular "*Va Pensiero*" by Verdi, the Mountain Song "*La Montagnara*" and the anthem "*Gloria*

A Te" with its trumpet accompaniment. The two hour concert ended with the nostalgic Italian farewell song "*Con Te Partiro*." As the singers took a final bow, the standing ovation lingered for long.

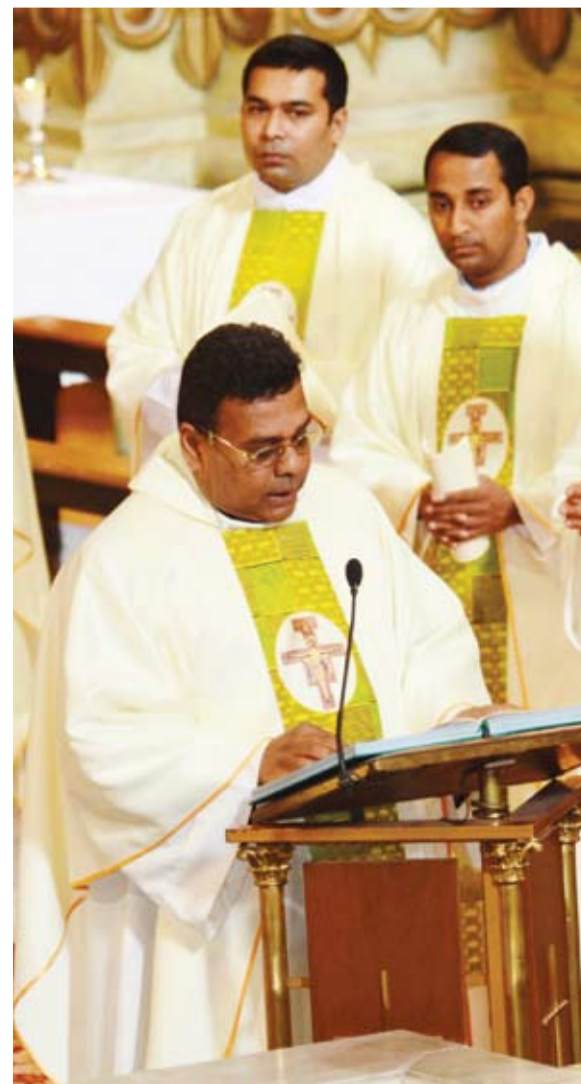

A Precious Icon

Our Lady of Perpetual Help

The icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help has a unique origin and symbolism and is a study in itself. It is a Byzantine painting of the Madonna and Child, dating from around the 14th century. Traditionally, it is said to be inspired by a similar icon-painting by St. Luke.

It was stolen from Crete by a merchant, taken to Rome by ship, sold to a Roman family and then through strange and marvellous events handed over to a church where it was venerated under the title, "Mother of Perpetual Help." Here it also went through a "hidden life" till it was handed over to the Redemptorist Fathers in 1865 for public veneration at the Church of St. Alphonsus, Rome, by the then Pope. It remains to date in this church. The icon has become one of the most popular images of the Madonna throughout the world. So it is also in our country, with the special shrine at All Saints' Church, Borella, and many others spread in Sri Lanka.

The message of this icon is that the Child in Mary's arms is Divine. He sees the terrible future that awaits him, with the angles bearing the names Gabriel and Michael (written in Greek) carrying the symbols of his passion – the cross, nails, lance, sponge. This Child is also Human. Otherwise, he would not show fear and run to his mother for protection and comfort. She holds him gently with both hands but her eyes are turned towards us. She helps her Son Jesus, and is perpetually ready to help us.

In this Year of the Word some Gospel references help us to identify better with Mother Mary under the title of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, and understand for ourselves why she can be OUR HELPER too...

A Helper to Joseph and Jesus, was Mother Mary, for sure. From Bethlehem to Egypt to Nazareth, right upto the end of their lives her motherly help was available. It seems to have been God's plan that she out-lives them both so that her perpetual help could be with them. And we know from the Gospels how this family, though comprising God's specially chosen ones, had to face so many struggles and challenges just as much as they enjoyed days and times of great happiness, peace and joy. They faced these joyful, sorrowful and glorious times together, with the luminous lamp of their faith, shining not only in them but through them to those around. They are a blessed and holy family held up to all families for their emulation.

Today, more than ever, we need this Mother of Perpetual Help to be a light to our families. One glance around our own families, those of our friends and in society at large, is enough to be saddened by the discord and divisions that are rampant. The dictum "the family that prays together, stays together," seems to be practised more by default than in reality.

Often, we question when "bad things happen to us" or when faced with many crosses.

Why me? Why us? The icon offers a message from Jesus, of the Motherly help needed in such crises. This Mother and Son have faced many challenges before us and understand our humanness, our cries and tears. It is we who need to turn humbly to the right sources for help.

A helper to Elizabeth, was Mary, already blessed with the great honour of bearing the long-awaited Messiah. She hastens to help her cousin Elizabeth in her hour

of need. A pregnant woman "in her old age" rejoices at the generous and kindly help she receives from her kinswoman Mary. In a Spirit-filled proclamation she recognizes that Mary, this young mother-to-be is "blessed among women" for the fruit of her womb is blessed abundantly. "Why is it that the Mother of my Lord should come to me?" is the stupendous question she asks.

Mary comes to us also as a Helper only to offer each of us "My Lord" and to all of us, "Our Lord." This is the greatest help she brings perpetually into our lives. She hastens to visit us in our moments of need, whether material or spiritual, to offer the gift of her Son, leading us closer to Him, "the Way, the Truth and the Life." May she help us whenever we call on her in the problems of our daily life and grant us also the grace to serve others unselfishly. Can we too reach out with our perpetual help to others in need?

A helper in ministry. Mother Mary was not a silent, passive spectator in the public life of Jesus. She followed him in spirit and prayer, with care and concern. She ministered to and mothered her beloved Son until the end. The Gospels confirm this. In Matthew 12:46f. the mother and brethren come 'asking to speak to him.' Jesus explains his definition of a relative, i.e., those who "do God's will," "hear the word of God and do it" (Luke 8:21). At the very first miracle of Jesus, the evangelist John tells us that it is Mary who reaches out to help an embarrassed bridal couple. A silent helper in the shadows, in the background, she enables Jesus to "manifest his glory" through this wonderful miracle at Cana (John 2:1f.). During his entire ministry Mary

would have continued to keep all these events "pondering them in her heart." (Luke 2:19). Finally, her help to Jesus was to manifest courage and steadfastness in his time of greatest agony. She was still the proud mother of her Son as she firmly stood beneath the cross (John 19:25). It is Jesus who offers us his Mother in his final dying moments to be our helper.

All of us have a mission and ministry in life according to our calling and Mother Mary continues to play that same role as she did for Jesus. When "trials and sorrows, reverses of fortune and painful privations" beset us, she is our refuge and hope. Have we in the Church taken the gifts of the Holy Spirit seriously?



In the liturgical readings of the feast of Pentecost (valid for all three years) there is an omission of certain verses from the prescribed text of the Second Reading for the Mass. What is already there is also significant for the Church conduct and welfare.

The First Reading is from Acts chapter two about the events of the first Pentecost. But the Second Reading is taken from the 12th chapter of the First letter to the Corinthian Community and in this reading vs 8-11 are omitted.

I wish to ask the liturgy experts the specific reasons for this omission. What is omitted is the enumeration of the nine gifts of the Holy Spirit. So many questions can be raised. Is the universal Church or Liturgy experts have a phobia towards the gifts of the Spirit? Are these three verses not beneficial to the Church administration? Are they afraid of the overwhelming thrust of the Holy Spirit? Is there a phobia that the so-called human leadership fear that greater action of the Holy Spirit will lead to chaos? Do they not have any faith concerning these gifts as enumerated by St. Paul?

If one goes through these gifts, 1) wisdom, 2) gift of knowledge, 3) faith, 4) to work miracles, 5) healing, 6) prophecy, 7) pray to tongues, 8) interpretations and 9) discernment. As Paul speaks, these gifts are for the community of the Church. And these particular manifestations of the Spirit are not merely for the individual

but for the general good. The Catechism records seven different gifts of the Holy Spirit and they are a) wisdom, b) understanding, c) counsel (right judgement), d) fortitude (courage), e) knowledge, f) piety (reverence) and g) fear of the Lord (wonder and awe).

When these verses were omitted, it can be surmised that the Church did not believe in these gifts? If these gifts are shunned then one can also conclude that the Church runs its course on mere human stamina? It happens that some of the so called fundamentalist churches make use of these gifts for renewal of Christian life and attracts them to their fold. One could adduce a further reason that there is a phobia towards the gift of tongues or glossolalia, or some have even an adverse attitude towards words of prophesy and the question can be asked whether these are only for Pentecostal churches?

So I do appeal to the Catholic leaders of the Church to make an in-depth study about these gifts and make use of them for the renewal and welfare of the Church?

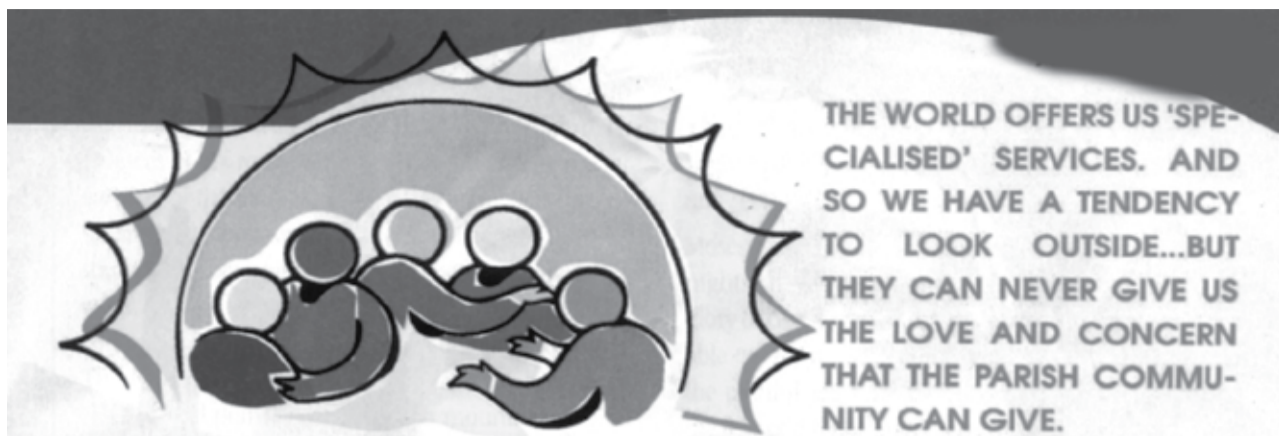

Today, it would be good to be honest and ask ourselves if there is fellowship in our parishes. Yes we do come and celebrate Holy Mass. And it is done with preparation and everything seems perfect. The choir, the decorations, the offertory, the multimedia are all in place and they are perfect. Yet our Church community seems to lack something. That spark seems to be missing. Our numbers do not increase like it did with the early Christian community described in the Acts of the Apostles. Is it not because we lack the 'fellowship' aspect of our worship?

We should realise that the Church compound is an extended altar. The Eucharist that was celebrated in the Church is extended in the fellowship that we share in the compound with one another. The Eucharist is not an

individualistic prayer. It is a community prayer. That togetherness in prayer becomes superficial when we restrict the prayer to within the Church and not take it outside into the compound. In the Church, we have together come in broken, and shared the joy of the body and blood of the Saviour. In the same way after the Eucharist, in the Church compound we share each others pain and joy. This is when the parish community has spark in them. It is not about which parish community is able to 'solve' problems better. It is about which parish community is able to 'listen' to our problems better.

When we stand around and share our problems with the parish community, we come to realise that ours is not the only problem in life. We realise that there are others going through similar problems. We find so many solutions to those similar problems. We

are able to advice others about similar problems which we were able to overcome. This is what makes our parish community powerful. This is when our parish community has a spark.

"Let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith"
(Gal 6:10)

In the earlier days, when families or individuals had problems they would look to the parish community for support and answers. Today when we have prob-

lems, we look outside. The world offers us 'specialised' services. And so we have a tendency to look outside. But let us remember that the world can give us specialised services but they can never give us the love and concern that the parish community can give. A community that has worshiped together should be able to share their pains with one another. A woman, who had left church few years ago, told me why she left. She said, "Father, I have nothing against the Catholic Church. But the problem

was that I never found any fellowship there. Everyone would come and worship and after that none of them had time for the other. In the Pentecostal Church that I go to they have the time for fellowship. We have the time to sit with one another. When we have problems, instead of going to the outside world we first come together and share that problem and pray over it. I don't find that in the parish Church."

We may disagree but if we are honest with ourselves we will rea-

lise that she speaks the truth. We lack fellowship. We lack genuine concern about the life of the one along with whom we worship. If our parish communities are more fellowship oriented, people will feel that they are at home. They will never think about leaving looking for 'greener pastures'. Fellowship does not mean that there will be a solution to all problems Rather it means that there will be a family who shares these problems and gives a listening ear.

Today, in Sri Lanka we celebrate Pope's Day. According to the Church Calendar, today is also the Feast Day of St. John the Baptist. It is the same Mission of leading the People of God to God's Kingdom that St. John the Baptist had to fulfill in his day and the Holy Father has to perform today.

We all know that St. Peter and all the Pontiffs who took his place are the Visible Heads of the Church. 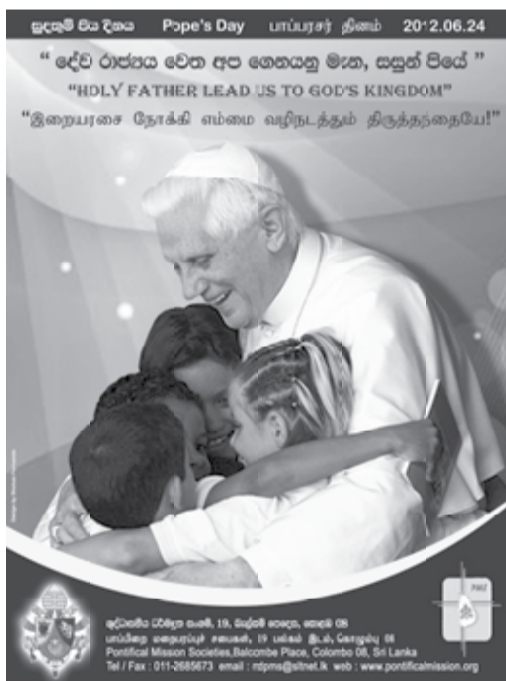

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Pope Benedict XVI Teachings

Pope Benedict XVI's main role is to teach about the Catholic faith and the solutions to the problems of discerning and living the faith, a role that he can play well as a former head of the Church's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. The main points of emphasis of his teachings are stated in Theology of Pope Benedict XVI.

"Friendship with Jesus Christ"

At the conclusion of his first homily as Pope he referred to both Jesus Christ and John Paul II. Citing John Paul II's well-known words, "Do not be afraid! Open wide the doors for Christ," Pope Benedict said:

Are we not perhaps all afraid in some way? If we let Christ enter fully into our lives, if we open ourselves totally to Him, are we not afraid that we might take something away from us?..... and once again the Pope said: No! If we let Christ into our lives, we lose nothing, nothing, absolutely nothing of what makes life free, beautiful and great. No! Only in this friendship do we experience beauty and liberation.... When we give ourselves to Him, we receive a hundredfold in return. Yes, open, open wide the doors to Christ - and you will find true life.

Benedict XVI: "The Eucharist is the enduring presence of Jesus' self - oblation." (Deus Caritas Est)

"Friendship with Jesus Christ" is a frequent theme of his preaching. He stressed that on this intimate friendship, "everything depends." He has also said: "We are all called to open ourselves to this friendship with God.... speaking to him as a friend, the only One who can make the world both good and happy..... All we have to do is put ourselves at His disposal.... This is an extremely important message. It is a message that helps to overcome what can be considered the great temptation of our time: the claim, that after the Big Bang, God withdrew from history." Thus in his book Jesus of Nazareth, His main purpose was "to help foster (in the reader) the growth of a living relationship" with Jesus Christ.

He took up this theme in his first encyclical Deus Caritas Est. In his personal explanation and summary of the encyclical, he stated: "If friendship with God becomes for us something ever more important and decisive, then we will begin to love those whom God loves and who are in need of us. God wants us to be friends of His friends and we can be so, if we are interiorly close to them." Thus, he said that prayer is "urgently needed... It is time to reaffirm the importance of prayer in the face of the activism and the growing secularism of many Christians engaged in charitable work."

St. John the Baptist - June 24

Born six months before our Lord, St. John the Baptist was the son of Zachary and Elizabeth, cousin of our Lady. He was the last and greatest of the prophets. As the forerunner of the Saviour, his mission was to prepare the Jews for the coming of Christ. When Jesus had come, St. John bore witness to Him before his own followers and encouraged them to follow Him.



Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading. Job. 38:1, 8-11.

Referring to the limits that God has placed on the powerful sea which is one of His creations. God tells Job that even suffering and evil have limits when it comes to the power of God, the Creator.

Second Reading. 2 Cor. 5: 14-17.

Human tendency is to live a life for oneself only. But St. Paul reminds us that whoever renews his life in Christ, cannot help but live for Christ, for the mere fact that he becomes a new creation.

Gospel. Mk. 4:35-41.

It shows us that though Christ is invisible he is with us. He is nevertheless with us to help and encourage us when we lack faith and entertain fears. The story of the calming of the storm explains this.

Reflection.

Today's readings invite us to face life with all its ups and downs with faith, hope and courage. As one song has it. "Some guys

have all the luck and some guys have all the pain." Some people have all the blessing of life whilst some are not blessed at all. There are some others who have a mixture of both. We are all called to accept life lovingly from God and to live it accordingly to his will bearing witness to him, who has called us to this life. We do this by living our day to day lives with faith, hope and courage. We are called to live by faith and it is faith that will set us free. Therefore we need to have faith because the Lord is with us in spirit and the Lord has all power and domain over all things. This is quite evident in today's readings. God too reminds us of this so that we may live a life faithful to Him.

Today's Gospel shows us that our lives would be full of storms, uncertainties, fears, dangers, sufferings...etc. But still we are expected to remain calm and quiet. We should not lose our faith just because we do not have an understanding of what God's plans are for us. We needn't be heartbroken, discouraged or depressed be-

cause of the suffering we undergo. Today's Second Reading reminds us that even our Lord underwent suffering and finally died on the Cross. Therefore we cannot question God for what our lives are. We can and should only find out what God expects from us in order that we too may be saved. And we too must find out ways and means of attaining this salvation which the Lord gained for us through suffering and death.

St. Josemaria Escriva June 26

Saint Josemaría Escrivá de Balaguer (9 January 1902 - 26 June 1975; also known as José María or Josemaría Escrivá de Balaguer Albás, born José María Mariano Escrivá Albás)



was a Roman Catholic priest from Spain who founded Opus Dei, an organization of laypeople and priests dedicated to the teaching that everyone is called to holiness and that ordinary life is a path to sanctity. He was canonized in 2002 by Pope John Paul II, who declared Saint Josemaría should be "counted among the great witnesses of Christianity."

St. Cyril of Alexandria - June 27

He was the Patriarch of Alexandria in Egypt and a most acute, profound theologian. As bishop and doctor, he became the glory of the Church in Egypt.



During the Council of Ephesus, he defended the oneness of persons in Jesus Christ and the divine maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary against the heresy of Nestorius.

St. Irenaeus - June 28

He was a disciple of St. Polycarp of Smyrna. At a time when Gnostic sects threatened to undermine Christianity by a perversion of Christian thought, St. Irenaeus vigorously denounced all heresies and safeguarded unity of belief.

He succeeded the martyred St. Pothinus in the See of Lyons.



Incorporated into the Church, the Body of Christ

1267 Baptism makes us members of the Body of Christ: "Therefore... we are members one of another." Baptism incorporates us into the Church. From the baptismal fonts is born the one People of God of the New Covenant, which transcends all the natural of human limits of nations, cultures races and sexes: "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body."

1268 The baptized have become "living stones" to be "built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood." By Baptism they share in the priesthood of Christ, in his prophetic and royal mission. They are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, that (they) may declare the wonderful deeds of him who called (them) out of darkness into his marvellous light." Baptism gives a share in the common priesthood of all believers.

1269 Having become a member of the Church, the person baptized belongs no longer to himself, but to him who died and rose for us. From now on, he is called to be subject to others, to serve them in the communion of the Church, and to "obey and submit" to the Church's leaders, holding them in respect and affection. Just as Baptism is the source of responsibilities and duties, the baptized person also enjoys rights within the Church: To receive the sacraments, to be nourished with the Word of God and to be sustained by the other spiritual helps of the Church.

1270 "Reborn as sons of God, (the baptized) must profess before men the faith they have received from God through the Church" and participated in the apostolic and missionary activity of the People of God.

The sacramental bond of the unity of Christians

1271 Baptism constitutes the foundation of communion among all Christians, including those who are not yet in full communion with the Catholic Church: "For men who believe in Christ and have been properly baptized are put in some, thought imperfect, communion with the Catholic Church. Justified by faith in Baptism, (they) are incorporated into Christ; they therefore have a right to be called Christians, and with good reason, are accepted as brothers by the children of the Catholic Church."

"Baptism therefore constitutes the sacramental bond of unity existing among all who through it are reborn."

(Catechism of the Catholic Church)
