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AT THE SHRINE OF MADHU I saw something I never thought I would see: Pope

Among the most significant issues that Pope Francis touched on during a fifty minute media conference on the six hour flight from Colombo to Manila, the capital of the Philippines on January 15, was his visit to the Sri Maha Bodhi Temple at Maligakanda, Maradana, the Shrine of Our Lady of the Rosary in Madhu and the Canonization of Saint Joseph Vaz.

In answer to a question posed by a journalist on his surprise visit to a Buddhist Temple the Holy Father explained, "Yesterday I saw something I never thought I'd see ... at the Shrine of the Madonna. It wasn't just Catholics, they weren't even the majority. There were Buddhists, Muslims, Hindus. They all go there to pray and they say they receive graces. There's something in the people there that unites them," Pope Francis said.

"If they are so naturally united that they come together to pray in that holy place, that is Christian, then how could I not go a to Buddhist Temple to greet them," he asked.

"This witness at Madhu yesterday was very important, it makes us understand the sense of inter-religiosity that is lived in Sri Lanka. There is respect



among them, Yes, there are small fundamentalist groups, but they are not of the people, they are ideological elites. They are not of the people."

Pope Francis also said that at the inter-religious encounter in Colombo, he had read what the Second Vatican Council said about the other religions and the values in other religions. "The

Church has grown a lot in these years and in respect...We are all on a path of conversion, which is a grace; always from sin to grace. This inter-religiosity as brothers, respecting each other always is a grace," he observed.

Continuing the Pope said, "You asked why did I go to the Buddhist Temple? The head of this temple had been



Pope invited for IEC in Philippines in 2016

After Pope Francis left Manila on the morning of January Monday, 19, the Archbishop



of Manila, Luis Antonio Cardinal Tagle has said that the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines have invited Pope Francis to attend the 51st International Eucharistic Congress (IEC) to be held in Cebu in Janu-

Pope Francis had approved the date and theme of the 51st International Eucharistic Congress which will take place from January 25 to 31, 2016 under the theme "Christ in you, our hope of glory" which is taken from the Letter of St. Paul to the Colossians.

The IEC began in 1881 as the fruit of the works of St. Peter Julian Eymard, Apostle of the Eucharist and is held every four years. The last conference was held in Dublin, Ireland in June 2012. The first ever IEC to be held in Asia was in Manila in 1937.


To commemorate this event a jubilee souvenir will be published under the patronage of the Parish Priest Rev. Fr. Jude Shamman.



I saw something...He is a very good friend of Cardinal Ranjith and there he met me and asked me to come to the temple and Cardinal Ranjith said he will get me there. Then, talking with the Cardinal I saw there was not much time... So returning to Colombo after Madhu there was the possibility of going to the temple, so we telephoned and we went there. In this temple there are relics of two disciples of the Buddha that for them are very important. These relics were in England and they managed to get them there and they took them out so we could look at them. He came to see me at the Airport; I went to see him at his house."

The Holy Father also spoke to journalists on the Canonization of Saint Joseph Vaz, which according to the Director of the Holy See Press Office, Fr. Federico Lombardi SJ, was something very close to the Holy Father.

Pope Francis said the Canonization of Saint Joseph Vaz was made with the methodology that is envisaged in the Church Law, it is called 'Equipollent Canonization'. It is used when after a long time a man or woman is blessed (has been beatified) and has the veneration of the People of God and de facto s/he is venerated as a saint and the process of a miracle is not made. They are persons who can be that way perhaps for centuries.

The Pope explained that the canonization of Saint Joseph Vaz took place when he decided to choose persons who were great evangelizers (men or women). The first was Peter Faber who was the evangelizer of Europe. He died, one could say, on the road. "These are persons that did great evangelization and so they are in accord with the theology of Evangelii Gaudium and for this reason I choose these people. That's it."

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Weeping Philippine girl challenges Pope

Children are not guilty of anything

A weeping 12-year-old Philippine girl, asking how God could allow children to become prostitutes, moved Pope Francis to hug her and appeal for everyone to show more compassion.

Glyzelle Palomar, a one-time homeless child taken in by a church charity, made her emotional plea during a meeting with young people at the Catholic University of Santo Tomas in Manila, ahead of a Holy Mass by the Pope to millions of faithful on the morning of

Sunday, January 18.

"Many children are abandoned by their parents. Many children get involved in drugs and prostitution," Palomar told the Pope as she stood on stage alongside 14-year-old Jun Chura who also used to be homeless.

"Why does God allow these things to happen to us? The children are not guilty of anything."

Palomar broke down and wept profusely, prompting the 78-yearold Pontiff with a man-ofthe-people reputation to take her into his arms and hug her for a few seconds.

The Pope later discarded most of his prepared speech that he was due to give in English, reverting back to his native Spanish to deliver an impromptu and heartfelt response.

"She is the only one who has put a question for which there is no answer and she wasn't even able to express it in words but in tears," the Pope told a crowd that organisers said reached 30,000.

The Pope, who was in the Philippines for a five-day visit, told those in the crowd that they first had to learn to cry with other marginalised and suffering people. He said superficial compassion, which resulted in just giving alms, shown by many in the world was not enough.

"If Christ had that kind of compassion, he would have just walked by, greeted the people, given them something and moved

on," he said, with his response echoed in English

Speaking to journalists Marcos said: "The Pope's message is for the poor, he wants to help the poor. If everyone followed the Pope's example, we would be assured unity and peace." These words are significant given that many remember Imelda Marcos for her collection of over 2700 pairs of shoes.

She also exercised a strong political influence in the country when her husband Ferdinand Marcos was President, a power no other first lady had had, before her. She was Minister of Human Settlements, Ambassador Plenipotentiary and Extraordinary, Governor of the National Capital Region and a member of the Interim National Legislature. She also held positions in many companies and government and public entities.

Highest crowd for a Pope ever in the Philippines



Six to seven million people braving the rain, lined the route to the Holy Mass presided by Pope Francis at Papal route to Rizal Park, Philippines, city officials estimate. That would be a record for a Papal event. About five million welcomed Pope John Paul II in Manila in 1995.


The Holy Mass at Rizal Park was be the Pope's final full day in the Philippines, where there are 80 million Catholics, concluding his six-day tour of Asia.

In his homily Pope Francis that God reminds us of our deepest identity. "All of us are God's children, members of God's family. Today Saint Paul has told us that in Christ we have become God's adopted children, brothers and sisters in Christ. This is who we are. This is our identity."


The Archbishop said that the Papal message on bridging the gap between




"I think the Holy Father is also inviting us to be discerning and to be critical," he said.

"Not everything new is necessarily good. Here I think the Christian spirituality of discernment can be handy," observed the Cardinal. "How do we immerse ourselves in the Word of God, in prayer, in the teachings of the Church, and with that deep resource how do you address the changes in the world?"

Cardinal Tagle said when speaking privately with Pope Francis, the Holy Father said one solid foundation is popular religiosity. "He said it is the simple faith that makes people survive the changes in society," said Cardinal Tagle.

Revival of God's Kingdom values in Sri Lanka

With the spectacular visit of Pope Francis and the launching of a new all-party National Unity Government, Sri Lanka has entered a new era which hopefully would be a golden chapter in the country's history.

Pope Francis, in his three-day pilgrimage which drew about 1.5 million people - the biggest crowd for any public event in Sri Lanka's history - brought a message of peace, reconciliation and unity with priority being given to poverty alleviation and sincere care for millions of people trapped in poverty.

President Maitripala Sirisena and Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe have repeatedly stressed that the government of the New Democratic Front (NDF) will be an all-party coalition - first of its kind in Sri Lanka. It is likely that the important bills including the vital constitutional amendment will get not just a two third majority but a unanimous vote in Parliament. That means yes votes from 224 of the 225 member-parliament, the exception being the Speaker who normally does not vote. Happily the President and the Prime minister, in a conciliatory move, have agreed to ask speaker Chamal Rajapaksa to continue.

With the approval of the vital constitutional changes including the revival of the 17th Amendment the powers of the Executive President will be devolved to the Cabinet of Ministers and Parliament and to Independent Commissions handling areas which constitute vital pillars of democracy.

For good governance and democracy, accountability and transparency, powers of the executive presidency will be devolved to the independent Judicial Services Commission, the National Police Commission, the Public Services Commission, the Elections Commission and to the commission probing allegations of bribery and corruption. Suitable members of these commissions will be nominated by an all party Constitutional Council and appointed by the President.

On January 29, an interim Budget will be presented by the new Finance Minister Ravi Karunanayake, a highly qualified chartered accountant. He and other government leaders have promised that as the first step towards poverty alleviation the prices of 10 essential items would be substantially reduced with salary increments and other relief measures being given to all workers.

Another important bill in the 100-day programme is a Code of Conduct for all MPs. Any member, even a minister, found guilty of violating this code will be sacked immediately. This will be part of the battle to check and curb rampant corruption running into hundreds of millions of dollars. Independent analysts say this was one of the main reasons for the downfall of the Rajapaksa regime and government leaders have pledged that all those against whom substantial evidence is available will be speedily tried in courts of law. If convicted they will face jail sentences while their assets will be seized and given back to the country and the people from whom billions of rupees were plundered.

In one of thousands of such cases the Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna - which has not joined the new government but is supporting it - filed a petition in the Court of Appeal against the LTTE's arms magnate Kumaran Pathmanadan or KP. According to the complaint KP allegedly owns a fleet of ships, tons of gold, supermarkets and fuel stations in several countries and other assets worth hundreds of millions of dollars. He was arrested by Interpol in Malaysia more than four years ago but has enjoyed luxury VIP protection up to now. The JVP has asked the court for an order that his assets worth billions be seized and given back to the poor people of this country.

We have seen the best of times, the worst of times and now, in the afterglow of Pope Francis' glorious visit we hopefully are seeing historic times with values and principles of the Kingdom of God.

Servants of the People

Our President Maithripala Sirisena, an unassuming and soft-spoken man said at his swearing-in that it would be the first and the last time that he would contest for the office of the president. This is in contrast to his predecessor who even changed the constitution to contest for the third time. Mr. Sirisena also said, "We do not need a king but a true human being to serve you."

The concept of servant is a very familiar theme in the Bible both in the Old as well as the New Testaments. In the Book of Isaiah the Lord says: "Here is my servant, whom I strengthen, the ones I have chosen, with whom I am pleased. I have filled him with my spirit and he will bring justice to every nation. He will not shout or raise his voice or make loud speeches in the streets" (Isaiah 42:1-2).

Servant Theme

Modern Biblical scholars dispute to whom Isaiah refers in his "servant poems." (Isaiah Chapters 40 to 55.) These poems or songs are also called "Ebed Yahweh songs" which literally means the songs of the Servant of God. Some say that Isaiah refers to the kings of Israel as the servants of God. Some say

that the reference is made to the prophets and some argue that it is a referral to the Messiah. In the connotation of kings it refers to the rulers of the people. Isaiah expects kings or rulers to be servants of the people.

When it applies to the Messiah it is shown in practice in the life and death of Jesus Christ Himself. He depicted Himself as the servant of God, who would demean Himself even to wash the feet of His apostles. He urged His apostles to follow Him in this humble gesture. "I, your Lord and Teacher, has just washed your feet. You then should wash one another's feet. I have set an example for you, so that you will do exactly what I have done to you." (John 13:12-16)

In the Book of Isaiah the servant poems continue in Chapter 49. Here the Prophet puts the servant theme into the mouth of the Prophet. "Before I was born, the Lord chose me and appointed me to be his servant...He said to me, Israel you are my servant, because of you, people will praise me." (Isaiah 49:1-3).

This servant theme continues in many books of the Old and New Testaments. In the Book of Psalms, "I am your servant, 0 Lord, I serve you, just as my mother did." (Psalm 116:16).

His Eminence Thomas Cardinal Cooray took a verse from Matthew 20:28 as the insignia in his court of arms: "To serve and not to be served." Jesus makes the mission of the Servant his own; he is the meek and humble of heart, (Matthew 11:29) who announces the salvation to the poor. (Luke 22:27)

The Biblical theme of *Ebed Yahweh* (servant of God) also is very much affiliated with the theme of *Kenosis*, which mean self-emptying. This theme of self-emptying is very well depicted in an ancient hymn used for prayers in the first century Christian churches. Paul in his letter to the Philippians is quoting this ancient first century hymn which the early Christians would have known by heart.

Paul says, "Your attitude should be the same as that of Jesus Christ: He always had the nature of God. But he did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made himself in human likeness and being found in appearance as a man. He humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross! Therefore God exalted him, to the highest place and gave him the name above every name...every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is the Lord." (Philippians; 2: 5-11)

Here the theme of kenosis (emptying of himself) and the servant-hood (ebed Yahweh) are very clear. This is the meaning of the word incarnation, God appearing in human flesh, emptying himself even to the state of a human.

Saint Joseph Vaz

St. Joseph Vaz was an epitome of a servant of God. He literally came to Sri Lanka as a labourer and sometimes disguised himself as a beggar. He served the persecuted and hidden Catholic communities settled down in various parts of the island. Most of his travelling was done on foot, to celebrate mass, to administer sacraments and to encourage the Catholic communities all over the island.

This is the Biblical theme of service and emptying which is depicted in many utterances of people such as Mahatma Gandhi who said "The best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others." Our President in his inaugural address referred to our founding fathers as D.S. Senanayake and S.W.R.D. Bandaranaike. It was S.W.R.D. Bandaranaike who said, "The highest obligation of a human being is to be of service to others."

The aim of the politicians should not be to amass as much wealth to oneself or to enjoy the perks of office, but to serve the electorate. It was another twentieth century statesman who said, "Ask not what your country can do for you but what you can do for your country." President J.F. Kennedy meant service to the country and to its people.

Justice C.G. Weeramantry in his book "A Call for National Reawakening" says the Sri Lankan politicians seek office to enjoy the very attractive perks of the office. "A fleet of vehicles, armed guards, an escort whenever one travels and numerous other perks. It pays to be a politician."

I recommend this 156-paged book written by the onetime President of the International Court of Justice as an excellent handbook for every politician who intends to serve the country and its people.

Saintly identity and Christ

A saint is a person who has found his or her true identity, true vocation, true life, true joy in Christ Jesus. The closer you get to Christ, the deeper you live in Him, the more you become truly and profoundly yourself.

Only when we get lost in Christ, we are found by Him. Only when we are found by Him, we can find Christ. When we find Christ, we find ourselves. When we keep a distance from Christ, we keep a distance from our very selves, too. When we become like Christ, we become deeply ourselves.

As Oscar Wilde points out; "He who would lead a Christian life is he who is perfectly and absolutely himself."

My true identity is forever hidden in Christ. When I hide myself in Christ, my true identity, which had been hidden in Him, surfaces. Unless it had been nourished and incubated in Him, it cannot shine through.

Saints always joyfully abandon their will, personal ambitions and agendas for a greater purpose. One's ability and humility to follow not one's own will but God's will is the real courage. To live for a higher purpose leads to a deeper joy.

The ultimate fulfillment and contentment in life can be had only in the process of living a holy life. Holiness cannot be achieved as a project. It is a gift bestowed on us without our full conscious control. It is something that happens to us, that is being constantly done to us.

More than anybody else, a saint radiates the image and likeness of God. Every saint convinces us that, no matter how bad the world appears to be, God is truly alive in our midst, in our chaotic World.

There is no way we can escape from God and therefore there is no way we cannot not become accountable to God for our conduct.

It is true that sanctity is a gift from God, but at the same time, our sanctity is also our precious gift to God. By making what we received from God our own, we return the gift to the giver. But when we return it, it has already acquired our zeal, our stamp, our imprint in it

Each person's sanctity is unique. One person's sanctity cannot be compared with another's. Holiness is nobody's monopoly and everybody's property.

Divine Glory and True Sanity

Great saints in human history show us as to what height we humans can spiritually aspire. But it is never for one's personal ambition or glory. It is all for the greatest glory of God. Our own Saint Joseph Vaz certainly belongs to this category.

Saints are the ever-active members of the Divine Orchestra that sings, chants, praises and exalts on and on and on the Divine glory. Saints have God as their only true valuable possession.

The one who is possessed by God possesses everything. The one who does not possess God possesses absolutely nothing for whatsoever he or she has acquired financially, materially and temporarily will be taken away sooner or later.

Sanctity is Christ living in us now and forever in order to cleanse us from all sins. Christ visits us always through saints. Christ continues to shine in and through each saint.

Not to become a saint is not to become a real human being; that is to say, not to live a full life, an authentic life. Saint is the real catalyst, the true revolutionary. Saints are never insane. Only a sane person could become a saint. Saintliness is our real sanity. We become insane, when we do not strive to become saints.

We cannot have a complete awareness of our holiness during our life-time. Only after our death, will it be gradually and fully manifested and realized. Fullness and fulfillment is a gradual process. Since only God knows fully the authentic shape of our holiness, He will be revealing it to future generations. The depth of one's holiness will be revealed only to others and can only be known by others and it is God who is behind this historical process.

Growing awareness of our sinfulness is the gateway to our growing holiness. It is true that self-awareness is a decisive factor but not sufficient in itself. After deep self-awareness must come constant struggle to do things differently and behave transformingly.

Each saint is a guiding star for those who have been ship-wrecked in the ocean of worldly chaos. A saint always recognizes the best in others and in so doing he or she also brings the best out of himself or herself.

God never belittles us in order to glorify or magnify Himself. He always magnifies, edifies, sanctifies, lifts us up. That is the true greatness and magnanimity of God. God is too great to belittle us. A great God makes others great too.

Since Christ brought out the best qualities even in sinners, the one who lives in Christ ought to do the same

A saint desires and wants others to be holier than himself. A saint desires deeply and wants truly others to become better saints than himself. The holier the others become, the easier for us to become holy. A saint wants others to enjoy the joy of saintliness. A saint raises others up over and above himself. That is the secret of his deep-seated joy, the secret of his heavenly bliss. Until and unless we make others happier, we cannot find true happiness. In this sense, saints are the happiest people on earth.

Real change in life requires hard work, quality time, a lot of patience and infinite humility. But ultimately it is a work of God's endless grace. Necessary things for a meaningful life will be revealed to the patient man. A patient man is a gracious man and a gracious man is a precious man. Such is the basic spiritual contours of a holy person.

Nobody can tell me who I am. Only God can do it satisfactorily since only God knows me completely and totally. Since I do

not know who really I am, I do need the help of God and also other people who are sincerely after my well-being. God desires nothing less than my total wellbeing and happiness.

Eternal Perspective and My True Vocation

I need a panoramic view of myself in order to see myself properly. Glimpsing God's perspective helps me to will the will of God. Seeing what God sees and willing what God wills is always for my best interest.

In order to love and serve others, we must become ourselves deeply. Confused person is a self-preoccupied person and hence cannot free himself from his confused state of mind. Confusion enslayes us. Authentic interior free-

Pope Francis praises Humanae Vitae;

ddressing a crowd of 20,000 people gathered in the Mall of Asia Arena, a newly opened events arena owned by a Filipino shopping centre chain which screened the Pope event, live, in all its cinema complexes across the country, Pope Francis spoke about the beauty of the family. He urged against a new form of ideological colonization which tries to impose new models.

The meeting began with testimonies from some poor families. Then there was the touching and dramatic story of a woman whose husband had to immigrate to Singapore to find work after just two years of marriage. Also, Renato and Anastasia Cruz, a deaf couple who had five children with normal hearing. They told the Pope about their difficult experience using sign language. They concluded by expressing their love for the Pope in sign language and he reciprocated in the same way.

Speaking off the cuff, Pope Francis said that a family without dreams is impossible. "When a family loses the ability to dream, it loses the abil-

"God's will is revealed to St. Joseph in his dreams," the Pope said "In this moment of rest in the Lord, as we pause from our many daily obligations and activities. God is also speaking to us." The Pope said that we need to be able to "rest in the Lord" and make time each day

"Like Saint Joseph, once we have heard God's voice, we must rise from our slumber; we must get up and act... So too, in our time, God calls upon us to recognise the dangers threatening our own families and to protect them from harm." On my desk I have a picture of St. Joseph sleeping, protecting the Church in his sleep. Yes, he does. And when I have a problem, I write a small message and place it under the statuette of St. Io-



seph so that he can see it in his dreams ... so that he can pray for my problem."

The Pope then went on to pronounce the key passage in his speech, speaking off the cuff: "Beware of ideological colonizations that aim to destroy the family, that do not originate in dreams, prayers, the encounter with God or the mission God has given us. They come from the outside, that is why I call them colonizations. Let us not lose the freedom God has given us, the family mission! Just as our fellow countrymen at a certain point in history decided to stand against political colonization, so families must be wise and show strength in saying 'no' to any attempt at ideological colonization of the family ... And ask St. Joseph for inspiration as to when to say 'yes' and when to say 'no'."

"Here in the Philippines," Pope Francis said returning to the prepared text, "countless families are still suffering from the effects of natural disasters. The economic situation has caused families to be separated by migration and the search for employment and financial problems strain many households. While all too many people live in dire poverty, others are caught up in materialism and lifestyles which are destructive of family life and the most basic demands of Christian morality. The family is also threatened by growing efforts on the part of some to redefine the very institution of marriage, by relativism, by the culture of the ephemeral, by a lack of openness to life."

Speaking off the cuff again, Pope Francis said: "I think of the Blessed Paul VI who faced the problem of defending openness to family life in the face of a population increase. He knew about the difficulties families were facing, this is why he was so merciful toward special cases and asked confessors to be very understanding and merciful in his encyclical, Humanae Vitae. In this encyclical Blessed Paul VI, looked ahead, he looked at the people of the earth and saw the impending threat of the destruction of the family through the deprivation of children. Paul VI was courageous, he was a good pastor and warned his flock about the wolf that was coming. Today he sends us his blessings from Heaven."

Pope Francis said, "Our world needs good and strong families to overcome these threats! ... Protect your families ... Be sanctuaries of respect for life, proclaiming the sacredness of every human life from conception to natural death." Pope Francis concluded by inviting families to be missionary families.

FLIGHT FROM MANILA TO ROME 'Responsible Parenthood' doesn't mean birth control

CNA - Pope Francis backed Blessed Paul VI's teaching against birth control and urged openness to life, but reminded couples that "responsible parenthood" does not require them "to be like rabbits" in order to be good Catholics.

"I believe that openness to life conditions the Sacrament of Matrimony. A man cannot give the Sacrament to the woman and the woman give it to him, if they are not in agreement on this point to be open to life," Pope Francis said.

During a January 19 press conference aboard Philippine Airlines flight PR 8010, two of 10 questions posed to Pope Francis referred to population growth and birth control.

Asked by a German journalist if the Church would open up to birth control as a means of population control and limiting poverty, he said that the openness to life of a married couple means "responsible parenthood."

"The key word ... and the one the Church always uses and I do too, is 'responsible parenthood.' How do we do this? With dialogue," said Pope Francis.

He said that each person should work with his pastor to carry this out. He said later that Churches have marriage groups, experts and pastors, adding, "I know so many ways out there that are licit and that have helped this."



The Pope illustrated an example of "irresponsibility": A pregnant woman he met recently, already with seven children, each born by caesarean-section.

"But does she want to leave seven orphans?" he asked. "This is to tempt God. Her response could be, 'No, I trust in God'," added Pope Francis.

Pope Francis' words harken back to the 1968 encyclical Humanae Vitae, in which Blessed Paul VI writes that it is 'licit to take into account the natural rhythms immanent in the generative functions' in order to space children for 'serious motives', such as

physical or psychological health, among other factors.

The Church supports Natural Family Planning - natural methods of spacing children which involve abstinence from sexual intercourse during a woman's fertile period, without the use of drugs, devices, and surgical procedures. In this way, human sexuality and fertility are respected rather than suppressed.

In a separate question, the Pope said that in rejecting the use of birth control, Paul VI "gave us something more. The refusal of Paul VI was not only to the personal problems ... but, he was watching the universal Neo-Malthusianism that was in progress," said the Pontiff.

He said you can recognise this phenomenon today in places like Spain and Italy, where the birth rate has plummeted to little more than one child per woman. The drastically low birth rates are a sign of Neo-Malthusianism, the Pope stressed to journalists on the plane, through which 'powers have sought to control humanity'.

"But, this also doesn't mean that the Christians must make children serially," he added.


"What I want to say was that Paul VI was not more antiquated, closed minded. No, he was a prophet who, with this, said to watch out for the Neo-Malthusianism that was coming," he concluded.

Behind the scenes Shelton Fernando of Thuduwawa and Anjelo Trevon Lovendhal from Ja-Ela were discussing the installing of a 3' Mahogany statue of Saint Joseph Vaz inside the Madhu Church with Rev. Fr. Emilianupillai (Fr. Emil), the Administrator of the

Madhu Church. This statue was made by Raymond Fernando of Moratuwa. The possibility of gifting the Holy Father with a statue of Our Lady of Madhu was also discussed. The idea was well received by all present and immediately Shelton phoned Raymond to find out if he would undertake the work. Coincidentally in Raymond's career of crafting sacred images, this statue would be his 100th statue.

After a telephone conversation with Fr. Emil, Raymond said that a photograph of Our Lady of Madhu without her mantle was taken and sent to him with instructions to follow the figure as depicted in the picture. This was the first time that a picture of the statue of Our Lady of Madhu was taken without her mantle solely for the purpose of carving the statue which was to be presented to the Holy Father. Meanwhile Fr. Emil also commissioned two other persons to make the statue with the view of selecting the best. However of the three parties, it was only Raymond who got back to him with a statue.

It so happened that I visited Raymond Fernando many times during those months to follow the progress of the Joseph Vaz statues that were being made by him for the Canonization Ceremony in his workshop. One day Raymond informed me that he was carving the statue of Our Lady of Madhu. Thereafter I was privileged to follow its progress - as little by little, day by day it came to life.

The statue was completed in 2 months and was gifted to Fr. Emil by Raymond to be in turn gifted to the Holy Father. A special wooden box lined with satin was made to carry the statue. Thus on the 13th of January three of

Raymond's close friends Christopher, Ranjith and Mangal transported the statue from Moratuwa to Madhu.

I was later informed that upon the presentation of the statue, when they saw how the Holy Father reacted to his gift, Fr. Emil and all those who had been party to the carving and transporting of the statue could not bear the happiness and cried tears of joy. It was also an emotional moment to all those who did not know anything about how this gift came to be given and merely watched the presentation on TV.

I asked Raymond Fernando what he felt when he saw this footage on TV and thereafter of the pictures splashed liberally in almost every newspaper. Raymond explained calmly: To bring this log of wood to life was for me a spiritual meditation - a deep prayer. I am but a mere instrument chosen by God to give to his people a vision to venerate. I can only say that when I am carving a sacred image I can feel that an all powerful force is leading me and guiding my hand. I live a simple life, I follow a moderate philosophy but at all times God is the center of my life and that, I believe, helps in my carving of sacred images. There are many people who I am very grateful to for having brought me to this stage in life. Bishop



Vianney Fernando of Kandy must be mentioned firstly. It is his humble qualities, respectfulness and strong leadership that encouraged me to continue in statue carving. The late Rev. Fr. Alex Dassanayake was another person who compelled me to use my God-given talents for the people. Not forgetting my dear friend Mr. Christopher who at all times has been and is my inspiration and advisor.



Diamonds of Holy Cross College on Blue Rhythmic Water Waves

The Holy Cross College, Kalutara emerged, in close proximity to Holy Cross Church, during the latter half of the 19th Century, with the initiative of a Burgher gentleman, named Brohier. Since then, day by day the school grew, reaching greater heights with "Disciplined Education" as a norm, and providing immense benefits to th2e motherland as well as the stake holders, while adding lots of attractive new features to its services catalogue.

Continuing its proud journey, Holy Cross College, Kalutara will be ready to pass another golden milestone, enriching its asset base with state of the Art "Swimming Pool Complex", which is a collective effort of the Old boys, Academic Staff, Parents, Prefects, students and well-wishers, with the guidance of Rev.Fr.(Dr.) Camillus Fernando, Rector HCC and the Management.

At the beginning of the journey of the Swimming Pool Project, the present office bearers of the old boys' union together with the Rector, identified and decided to construct a state of the art swimming pool for the College, with the intention of uplifting the standards of the students, bring forth national level swimmers with the support of expert swimming coaches. The Swimming pool complex consists of 25 m x 6 lanes, changing rooms and a viewing gallery. Easy access to the Swimming pool and ample parking space will enhance the value of the complex. On that day, whole of Kalutara town was covered with Holy Cross College flags and banners from well-wishers, providing greater awareness on the swimming pool project.

Rev.(Dr.) Camillus Fernando, Rector of HCC, specially stated the project as an In-House creation with the immense contributions of Mr. Supun Hevavitharana, Archi-



tect, Mr. K.S. Mangala Silva, Structural Engineer and Mr. Ajith Vandabona, Geo Technical Engineer; all are old boys of HCC. Also he emphasized the friendly corporation provided by the contractor Crist Pool Creations Pvt. Ltd.

Project team is fortunate to realize the dream of the swimming pool within the exact period of one year, which can be considered as a great achievement. The Rector stated that the management of HCC initially wished to open the facility to selected segments such as Old Boys, government and private sector institutions, as phase I.

Inaugural opening is planned to be held on 30th

January 2015. This will be the most colourful event in the history of HCC and His **Eminence Malcolm Cardinal** Ranjith will be the chief guest. The ceremony is sechduled at 10.00 am with a welcome for His Eminence in front of Holy Cross Church. Then the distinguish guests and invitees will proceed to the Swimming Pool deck for the blessing. Thereafter HCC Students will present a colourful water display and a water ballet. Immediately afterwards all will gather at the College grounds for the meeting, planned to be held under Parabolic Marquee with 6000 seating capacity. In this historic occasion the Rector HCC hopes to present the outcome of the

Ivan Jayasundera from Kandy, Fr. Anton Sriyan from Ratnapura and Fr. Rex Saundra from Jaffna. The Committee received support from the

Under the dynamic leadership of Mr. Tilak Peiris, a special team of committed lay Catholics - Maxine, Carmel, Edsel, Priyantha, Dilhan, Anthony, Sheika, Sean and Ornille worked round the clock to ensure that everything from the transport, accommodation and food for the Choristers was well organised.

Appreciation

Rev. Fr. Alexis Dasanayake, Vice Postulator in the Cause of Blessed Joseph Vaz since 2009 and live wire in the production of the film about Blessed Joseph Vaz, returned to his Creator on December 4. He contributed immensely to the Church in the Chilaw Diocesan and at national

Hailing from Etiyawala, a village in Dummala Kotuwa Parish in the Diocese of Chilaw he was born on July 13, 1931. He had his education at St. Mary's College, Chilaw and Joseph Vaz College, Wennapuwa.

Dasanayake was the first student of St. Paul's Seminary when it was started by Bishop Edmond Peiris OMI, at Ulhitiyawa. He entered the seminary at Ampitya in 1950 and after finishing studies there joined the Papal Seminary at Pune, India in 1955. He was ordained a priest on October 3, 1957.

Returning to Sri Lanka in 1958 young Fr.

Dasanayake was posted to the Chilaw Parish as Assistant. After two years service in Chilaw and a short stint in Puttalam, he was appointed Parish Priest at Mawathagama.

Dasanayake Fr. joined the Lateran University in Rome in 1963 for higher studies in Theology. He obtained a Doctorate in Theology

On his return to Sri Lanka he was appointed as assistant to the Rector of St. Paul's Seminary which was by then shifted to Marawila, in 1965 where he served for two years. His next appointment was as Secretary of the Diocese Bishop Edmond under Additionally Fr. Dasanayake took charge of St. Peter's Children's Home and St. Peter's Industrial School in Chilaw.

When the Children's Diocesan Catechetical Centre was inaugurated in 1969, Fr. Dasanayake was appointed as Acting Director there. He dedicated himself for the development of the new institution and started training programmes and examinations for Catechists.

For 10 years Fr. Dassanayake served as Parish Priest in Boralessa, Katuneriya and Wennappuwa, all highly Catholic populated parishes. He was always with his flock and the parishioners in turn cooperated with him.

In 1981 he was appointed Director of the Diocesan Catechetical Centre. Catechetists in the diocese reached new heights during his time. Fr. Dasanayake was then appointed Director of the National Catechetical Centre in Colombo in 1983. He served in the post for 13 long years and for some time he was a lecturer at the National Seminary, Ampitiya.

Dasanayake Fr. was selected as a full time lecturer at the seminary in 1995 and served their for 14 years before being appointed the Vice Postulator in the cause of Blessed Joseph Vaz. He was entrusted with the preparation of the final report for Canonization of Blessed Joseph Vaz. With the able assistance of the Bishops' Conference and a host of priests he meticulously gathered all available documents and submitted the final document.

Fr. Dasanayake, a soft spoken priest with mild manners led a very simple life. He was liked by priests and the faithful alike. A prominent feature in his life was the great dedication he had for any work he was entrusted with. He was undoubtedly a true follower of Blessed Joseph Vaz for whom he had a great devotion and love.

Chapter Two (2) (179-192).

How we celebrate the mysteries of Christ.

Christ the Lord Himself is the one who celebrates the cosmic liturgy, priests and believers participate in different ways in Christ's Divine Worship. In the liturgical service, God gives Himself to us under the form of holy signs, so that we are to do the same; give ourselves to Him.

We, human beings are spiritual and bodily creatures. We need signs and symbols in order to describe spiritual realities. The mystery of Incarnation gives us human signs in which God is living and active among us.

Bread and wine, the water of baptism, the anointing with the Holy Spirit... thus, liturgy means encountering God, which means allowing Him to act - listening and responding to Him. As far as the liturgy is concerned, time becomes time for God. In the liturgical aspect, every second is filled with a meaning. As we celebrate the liturgy, we really experience the fact that God has sanctified time and made every second a gateway into Eternity.

It is to be noted that all time is God's time, memories of Jesus and His teachings are at the same time encounters with the living God.

The Liturgical Year of the Church:

This is a systematic way of reflecting God's plan in the person of Jesus Christ. The liturgical year begins with Advent, the time of waiting for the Lord; Christmas season (celebration of redemptive suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus). Thus the Easter season ends with the feast of Pentecost. Feasts of the blessed Mother and the saints through which the Church praises God's graces are too, included.

Sunday is the centre of Christmas time. We as the people of God celebrate the resurrection of Jesus on Sunday, hence every Sunday is a 'miniature Easter'.

Having comprehended the significance of Sunday, it is in a way apt to speak about the liturgy of the hours. Liturgy of the hours is the universal, public prayer of the Church. In this prayer, the world gives the Triune God the opportunity at every hour of the day to transform those who pray. This prayer is prayed even by the Christians who take their faith and join their voices with the many, thousands of praises and petitions that ascend to God from all over the world.

There are changeable and unchangeable components of the liturgy. Unchangeable is everything which is from the Divine origin; the words of Jesus at the Last Supper. The changeable parts, which the Church occasionally changes. Thus, the mystery of Christ must be proclaimed, celebrated and lived out at all times and in all places.

Fr. Placidus celebrates unique 'double'

Rector of Aquinas University College, Borella, Rev. Fr. Placidus de Silva, celebrates a unique 'double' on January 22. On this day he counts 45 years of priestly ordination as well as 71 years of the gift of life.

Soon after his ordination, from 1970 to 1972, Fr. Placidus served as personal secretary to the late Thomas Cardinal Cooray OMI. After a staff ap-

pointment at St. Aloysius Seminary, in 1977, Fr. Placidus graduated from the London School of Economics, University of London. On his return to the island he was appointed Rector of St.



Aloysius Minor Seminary. From 1989 to 2002 he served as the Episcopal Administrator and Vicar General and from 2002 to 2006 as the Chancellor of the Archciocese and Parish Priest of St. Lucia's Cathedral, Kotahena. From 2006 to-date he has held the position of the Rector of Aquinas University College, Borella.

Hailing from a family of five children and being the only son, his mother was not totally supportive of his decision to join the priesthood, but God who works in mysterious ways had the final say to which his family and Fr. Placidus himself had no hesitation in acceding to God's will.

Fr. Placidus had the rare privilege of being a concelebrant at the Holy Masses officiated by Their Holinesses Pope Paul VI (1970), Pope John Paul II (1995) and now Pope Francis (2015).

Both, Dr. A.T. Navaratnam and Dr. (Mrs.) Vimala Navaratnam served as the Official Doctors for leading five star Hotels in Colombo, as well as leading Airlines and Diplomatic Missions.


They were just a phone call away, even into the wee hours of the night or morning and, over the years, during the many surgeries I underwent, one of them would be in attendance as the Assisting Physician. Selected Quotations on Children's Rights

- ☐ Everyone under 18 years is a child and should enjoy all the children's rights.
- All children have their rights whatever their age, sex, disability, colour, race, language or religion.
- Every child has the right to have a name from birth and be given a nationality. She or he has the right to know and be cared for by her/his parents.
- Children should not be separated from their parents unless it is in the interest of the child (due to neglect, abuse etc.) If parents live apart, the child has the right to be in contact with both parents, if separated from one or the other, or both.
- The child has the right to get information and give any information to others and to express her or his view unless this would violate the rights of others.
- Every child has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion, subject to parental guidance and national law.
- ☐ Both parents should have joint responsibility for bringing up their children.
- Children have a right to be protected from all forms of abuse and neglect. Parents and other care-givers have no right to hurt children. The State should undertake programmes to prevent and help children recover from abuse and neglect.
- ☐ If a child is to be adopted, it should be done legally and arranged in the best interest of the child.
- If a child has to leave her or his home or country because it is not safe to live there, he or she has the right to special protection and help
- Children with mental or physical disabilities have a right to special care, education and training, designed to help them become as self-reliant as possible and lead a full and active life.
- All children have a right to education. The State should make sure that at least primary education is compulsory and is free of charge.
- Children have a right to be protected from work that may be harmful to their health, education or development. The State should set minimum ages for employment and regulate working conditions.
- Every child has the right to protection from sexual exploitation and abuse, including involvement in prostitution and pornography.
- No child should be tortured or punished cruelly, given life imprisonment or capital punishment, be unlawfully arrested or deprived of liberty. Any child lawfully deprived of liberty has a right to appropriate treatment, to be separated from detained adults, contact with family and access to legal or other assistance.
- ☐ Children have the right to protection in times of war. No child under 15 years of age, can take part in hostilities or be recruited in the armed forces. The State should provide care and protection to all children affected by armed conflict.

Short cut to Heaven

A disciple asked his teacher, "What is the easiest way to go to heaven?" The teacher replied, "At the time of death, call on the name of God, and die." If one thinks that to go to heaven one has only to call the name of God at the time of death, and it is an easy thing to do, he might be making a serious mistake. Things may not be that easy.

The time of death is man's most critical time. The time when life departs from the body! Nobody likes this moment and everybody seems to be afraid of it. At such a time it is difficult to imagine what would be the mental state of the dying person. It is the time when we have to go away from our near and dear ones, leaving all the things we love and cherish. So it would be worthwhile to imagine what our attitude would be at such a time and what would be our parting words. Will we be able to say 'God' at that most critical time?

To die with the name of God on our lips, we ought to live our entire life relying on Him. A person who has lived away from God all his life, wallowing in sin, forgetting God, will never be able to call on the name of God at the most critical juncture of his life.

Even as he was hanging on the cross, Jesus crying with a loud voice, said, **Father**, **into your hands I commend my spirit** (Lk 23:46). We should understand that if Jesus could say these words even when He was convulsing with excruciating pain, in the mental agony and throes of death, It was because of the intense and intimate relations he had with the Father.

Jesus was so close and united with the Father He could say, "The Father and I are one" (Jn 10:30). This is the fellowship of the Holy Triune God. It was because of this fellowship that Jesus kept Himself close to the Father in all the moments of crisis and the Holy Spirit hovering about him. Jesus prays on the Mountain before He chooses his disciples (Lk 6:12) and He prays at Gethsemane before His crucifixion (Mt 26:36). At all these times Jesus was in unity with the Father and the Holy Spirit. It was because of this fellowship and unity that Jesus was able to pray to the Father even as He was convulsing with the throes of death.



When Peter saw Jesus coming towards him walking on water, He requests Jesus to order him also to walk on water Peter did walk. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me! (Mt. 14:30). He could do that because during his lifetime he had realized that his salvation is in the Lord. Only those who have such a conviction can pray like that in times of grave crises.

St. Stephen is the first martyr of the Church. His adversaries had surrounded him and they were pelting stones to kill him. His body was bruised and lacerated by the sharp and heavy stones hitting him, but even as he was convulsing in the spasms of agonizing pain, he cried, **Lord Jesus, receive my spirit** (Acts 7:59), He could say that because he could see, with his inner eyes, that Jesus was standing close to him.

The two thieves hanging on the sides of Jesus are also two symbols. One died speaking ill of Jesus. The other one is also a thief, but at the time of his death he was able to hold fast to the name of God.

He said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom" (Lk 23:42). We do not

know the previous history of the thief who seeks forgiveness at the last minute of his life. But this is what Jesus told him, **Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise** (Lk 23:43).

All the martyrs and saints of the Church died calling on the name of Jesus as they were dying. Jesus incarnated as a man so that we all can call on the name of God in our last moments.

He descended from heaven and was born in the manger, smelling of milk. He dwelt amongst us. He walked along with us loving and teaching us. Still we often tend to ignore Him, forget Him. If we are to die with the name of Jesus on our lips we ought to know God, who was revealed through Jesus, and live obeying His commandments.

Infant Jesus whom we see and adore in the manger should be loved and nurtured in our hearts. If Jesus is in our hearts, when trials, tribulations and torments come to our life, we will remember Him and He will definitely come to our rescue. We should die calling on His name. Truly, you will then be saved!

Reflection.

It requires detachment from the world and most of all from sin. Before the birth of Jesus as in the First Reading, during the time of Jesus as in the Gospel and after the time of Jesus, that is the time of the Apostles as in the Second Reading and for that matter even today, the Good News for the people has been the same. "DETACH YOUR SELF FROM THE WORLD AND SIN, REPENT AND BELIEVE."

From the time man sinned against God; God's redemptive love has been at work. From time to time through many people God tried to save mankind. Finally, He saved mankind through His Son, Jesus Christ, the Saviour.

The people of Nineveh

were living in sin and so they were condemned and were to be destroyed. But God out of love sent Prophet Jonah with a message of repentance. The people accepted his message, repented and were saved.

John the Baptist preparing the way for the Lord preached a message of repentance. After he was arrested, Jesus came to the region, to Galilee not to condemn or fight for the freedom of John, but to proclaim the message of repentance. He even chose many Apostles to help Him and to continue His work after Him.

In the Second Reading we see the Apostles, especially St. Paul carrying the same message, repent and believe.

So as we in this New Year prepare ourselves in various ways to serve the Lord, let us keep in mind that even today, for the kind of society we live in, the urgent message is a message of repentance. Let us therefore, in all humility and courage proclaim the message of repentance lest the whole world be destroyed by sin.

Due to the urgency of the need to save the world from suffering and sin, we might think of condemnation and fighting our way through, but it will only add to the burden and will and bring in more and more suffering and sin.

There is no weapon like love. There is nothing like voluntary repentance and conversion. Let us therefore imitate the Lord. Let us proclaim with love, a message of repentance.

Blessed is he who is able to make people repent and convert them from their sins, they are the most fruitful people and living God's word on the earth.

St. Vincent de Paul dearly loved a young man who had grown up like wild flower. A violent ray of passion entered the young man's soul and the flower withered and fell, the young man became so licentious that the Saint wept bitterly. "Well"

St. Vincent said to him one day. "I cannot persuade you any longer to give up your bad ways because I see that my words are of no help. However, there is one thing I would like you to do." "Amen, I say to you, whoever does not accept the Kingdom of God like a child will not enter it" (Mark 10,13-16)

1. With the words, "Let the children come to me; do not prevent them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Amen, I say to you, whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it", Jesus holds up children as model for His disciples. Why does He do it? Is it because children are innocent? From our experience, we know they are not that innocent at times. Then how does He uphold them?

i. Children totally depend on and trust in their parents. Similarly, the disciples of Jesus should completely depend upon and trust in God and obey the Gospel. Then only they begin to experience that they are ruled by God; that they enter God's Kingdom (reign of God).

ii. Children are simple, humble and open. They are in Jewish society an insignificant lot, a non-entity and a non-being without rights. Similarly the disciples of Jesus must become humble and insignificant in the Church or community. They must remain ordinary in the community. Then only they would own the Kingdom.

2. The values of the Kingdom are radi-

cally opposed to those of the world. The disciples of Jesus should not follow the mind of the rich man (in the following episode: Mark 10,17-31), who thinks he can inherit God's Kingdom by his own merit, "Teacher, all of these I have observed from my youth." Instead, the disciples may don the attitude of receptivity, humility, insignificance and trustful dependence characteristic of children.

3. Today we live in a world, ruled by science and technology. Science based Technology has at times become the 'God' of humanity. Albert Einstein predicted: "I fear the day when the technology overlaps with our humanity. The world will only have a generation of idiots." Einstein said and was true. The day has arrived; we live in it.

We see parents chatting to each other while walking on the beach. We also see, alas, their young children seated on beaches but busy with their own mobiles and other electronic gadgets. They hardly bother why they have come to the beach with their parents. They leave the beach without seeing even the beauty of the sea or the setting of the sun. It is the same tragedy that Technology has caused at public places, where

man has to interact with his fellow human being, like restaurants, parks, schools and bus halts. Man has become so individualistic and excessively privacy conscious.

At the Renaissance, man moved from self supporting agricultural village life and domestic industry to the capitalist factory system and modern industrialism. Now in this Technological Age, he is satisfied only with producing and acquiring more sophisticated technologies. He finds no meaning in pondering over the meaning and destiny of his life. Roger Evered is right to say in Some Human Consequences of Technology (1985) 110: "Once the servant and ally of man technology, seems to have acquired a life of its own to such an extent that now man is under threat of becoming the servant of Technology."

4. This mass tragedy of human race calls our attention, on this Holy Childhood Sunday, to re-read and reflect on the words of our Lord, "Let the children come to me; do not prevent them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these." We all need to belong to God's



rule, and not to the servitude of Science and Technology. The Gospel of Jesus has to be taken seriously 'to be little flowers of Jesus who adorn the world' (the special theme of this Sunday). Just like kids who depend completely on their parents; we need, in these hard times, to swim upward against the current in total trust in God. We ought to live the mode of being away from the mode of having more. Let God be the God of our life to rule and direct it towards its destination – His Kingdom.



Activity 1 - Linking Words- Cohesive Links : Linking words signal how one idea leads on from another. **Knowledge** of linking words is essential to understand texts. Here are some simple linking words. They are also useful in writing.

1. **Position in the text.** Some linking words normally form a link between clauses within a sentence or a link between sentences.

Activity 2: Read the text and underline the linking words.

Amila is a very rich girl but she leads a simple life. She is an officer in the Sri Lankan Army. She gets up early in the morning and prepares her lunch until 6.30 a.m. Then she gets ready to go to her office. She gets transport because she works in the head office. She does different kinds of work such as attending to leave records, preparing letters to reply to inquiries and preparing notices, and announcements for internal communication. Her work is so important that she cannot afford to take leave.

Linking words of time - still, yet and already: 'Still' tells us that an action is continuing, or hasn't happened yet. It has positive, negative and question forms. e.g. Its 10 o'clock and John's still in bed.

or She said that she would be here an hour ago and she still hasn't come. or Are you still living in London?

'yet' asks if something has happened, or to say that something hasn't happened. It is mainly used in negatives and questions and comes at the end of a sentence. 'Yet' is usually used with the present perfect tense.

e.g. He hasn't finished the report yet. OR Isn't dinner ready yet?

'Already' is used to say that something happened before expected, it usually comes

in mid position, but can also come in final position. 'Already' is not used in negatives and in British English is only used in questions to show considerable surprise.

e.g. I'll tell her that dinner is ready. She already knows. Have you finished already?! I thought it would take you longer!

In order to understand this type of linking word, you must be clear about the concepts of 'a point in time' and 'a period of time'. A point in time is the answer to a 'when' question, and a period of time is the answer to a 'how long' question.

e.g. Points of time = 6 pm, Wednesday, she arrived, summer, 1999, Christmas, five minutes ago. Periods of time = 3 seconds, 4 days, ages, 100 years, the Christmas holiday, five minutes linking words of time

Although, though, even though and In spite of / despite

'Although' must join two clauses, but its position can change. It can either start a sentence or come in the middle.

e..g. Although it rained a lot, we enjoyed the holiday. OR We enjoyed the holiday although it rained a lot.

In spoken English 'though' can be used instead of 'although' when it is used for the second clause.

e..g.. "I didn't get the job though I had all the necessary qualifications." 'Though' can also come at the end of a sentence.

e..g. "The house isn't very nice. I like the garden though." 'Even though' is a stronger form of 'although'. e..g.. Even though I was really tired, I couldn't sleep. 'In spite of' or 'Despite' must be followed by a NOUN, PRONOUN (this, that, what etc.) or \sim ing.

e.g. In spite of the rain, we went to the beach. OR We went to the beach in spite of the rain.

It is common to use the expression 'In spite of the fact (that)....' or 'Despite the fact (that)....'

e.g. She's quite fit in spite of the fact that she smokes 40 cigarettes a day.
